I was reading Yoko Ota's, City of Corpses. The novel is based on her experience of radiation exposure in Hiroshima during World War II. Here is a quote, "The crowds on the riverbanks grew larger and larger. They quickly found their own small dwellings and settled down there. It seemed to me that human beings are always hasty in choosing where they are going to settle down. Even in the open air, they want to have a clear monopoly on their seats without being mixed up with others."

This painting is the scene right after the atomic bombing, when people gather on the riverbank in search of water. I was very impressed by this scene, described from a very detached perspective, even though she herself was exposed to radiation. It reminded me of a crowded food court in a shopping mall.



I have often thought about care. "Care is a labor of love that must often continue even when love wavers."

I was reminded of the words. I read something about it. In Japanese, care is written as 世話. The kanji 世 I used. I collected and painted many scenes of labor of love.
